

## Archaeology Beyond the Academy: Profiling the Profession: Reflections on Cultural Resource Management in the UK and Canada



## **Marc Storey**

Abstract: In the mid- to late 20<sup>th</sup> century, newly introduced heritage legislation in Europe and North America expounded the social value of archaeological remains and prescribed that developers, rather than government, pay for appropriate survey or excavation prior to any action affecting such remains. The modern profession of the consultant archaeologist was thus born. This talk will identify the differences between cultural resource management (CRM) in Canada and the UK. For each respective country the history and development of CRM will be tracked and the current and projected profiles of the industry will be compared from the standpoint of opportunities for mutual learning and professional development.

Speaker Bio: Marc has 15 years of CRM experience in the UK and Europe, where he directed archaeological work programmes within a range of major infrastructure projects. He also served as Deputy Head of the Geomatics Department at Oxford Archaeology, Europe's largest archaeological and heritage consultancy. Since returning to Canada five years ago, Marc has worked in CRM both in eastern Canada and, more recently, Alberta.
